Message by Bishop Kosen Ishikawa

Dear Members and Friends,

On April 17, 2025, the "Three Great Canons" (official name: "Three Editions of Buddhist Sacred Canons") stored at the Zojoji Temple in Tokyo, were newly inscribed in the UNESCO's "Memory of the World" program. These scriptures were originally collected from across Japan in the early 17th century by Tokugawa Ieyasu (1543-1616), the first shogun of the Edo Shogunate, and were donated to Zojoji, the head temple of the Jodo Shu.



It is quite surprising that this announcement was coincidentally made on the memorial date of Ieyasu's death, but I am truly delighted by this news as a minister of Jodo Shu. I would like to take this opportunity to explain about the Buddhist Canon called "Daizokyo" in Japanese and its historical significance.

Daizokyo literally means "Great Repository Sutra" which is the comprehensive collection of Buddhist scriptures that records the teachings of the Buddha. In short, it is like the Buddhist Bible or an encyclopedia of Buddhism. These texts were compiled with the aim of collecting, organizing, and passing down the Buddha's teachings as Buddhism spread.

The sutras (scriptures) that we recite during Buddhist services are just a super tiny part of the full canon. Buddhist teachings are broadly divided into three categories:

Sutra (経, Kyo): The Buddha's teachings and discourses

Vinaya (律, Ritsu): Monastic rules and precepts

Abhidharma (論, Ron): Analytical commentaries and philosophical interpretations of the teachings

In English, the term Tripitaka is commonly used as Tripitaka means "three baskets". In Chinese-influenced cultures, the complete canon is also called Issaikyo (一切経), meaning

"all the teachings." All Japanese Buddhist sects were born based on one of the scriptures of Isaaikyo.

All of these were translated and transmitted from Pali and Sanskrit as Buddhism spread from India to China and Korea. In particular, the development of printing technology in China and Korea led to the widespread use of woodblock printing, greatly contributing to the dissemination of Buddhist thought and culture.

In addition to these, there are also Tibetan versions (the Tibetan Buddhist Canon) and Pali versions (the Pali Canon). However, the "Three Great Canons" (registered as *Memory of the World*) refer specifically to the following three editions of the Buddhist Canon, which were woodblock printed in China and the Korean Peninsula during the 12th to 13th centuries:

Sikei Edition (思溪版大蔵経) - Printed in the Southern Song dynasty, 12th century (5,342 volumes)

Funeiji (Puning) Temple Edition (普寧寺版大蔵経) - Printed during the Yuan dynasty, 13th century (5,228 volumes)

Korai Edition (高麗版大蔵経) - Printed in the Goryeo dynasty, 13th century Korea (1,357 volumes)

These total around 12,000 items in all. They are not only complete reproductions of Buddhist scriptures but are considered to be works of art due to the high quality of woodblock printing. These editions are central to the intellectual and spiritual history of sinographic cultures.

The Memory of the World program by UNESCO aims to preserve and protect important documentary heritage for humanity and to promote universal access to it. This registration acknowledges the historical and cultural value of Zojoji's "Three Great Canons" in the context of East Asian Buddhist culture, the advancement of printing technology, and the preservation of Chinese-character-based intellectual heritage. Since Tokugawa Ieyasu donated them over 400 years ago, they have been well preserved and even survived the Great Kanto Earthquake in 1923 and Tokyo's destruction during the World War II air raids in 1945.

As part of the 850th Anniversary of the Jodo Shu, Zojoji Temple has been working on digitizing these scriptures with support from the sect. On November 20, 2023, a digital archive was released online.

Total: Approx. 480,000 images, around 4TB of data All images of each scripture included Searchable by title and translator/author (Japanese only for now) Free public access

This is expected to significantly contribute to Buddhist studies and cultural preservation.

By the way, buildings that house the Tripitaka are called Kyozo (scripture repository). On the Big Island, Kohala Jodo Mission uniquely has such a scripture hall. It holds a reduced-size printed version of the Tripitaka, known as the "Shukusatsu Daizokyo", a modern compact edition based on Zojoji's "Three Great Canons."

It is meaningful that this compilation of Buddhism has made its way to Hawaii as an object of faith and devotion and now available online for free! With this registration as a springboard, I hope to introduce more of Buddhism's history during Sunday services in the future. If you haven't been to our Sunday Service, I strongly recommend you to participate. Especially during this Koinobori celebration, we have guest speakers every Sunday and we are very grateful that our Fujinkai ladies prepare delicious refreshments. Maybe I, too, will bake my renowned chiffon cake for you.

Koinobori Celebration

"Koinobori" means carp streamer kite and the carp was chosen as the symbol for Children's Day because Japanese people consider the carp as the most spirited fish, full of energy and power to fight its way

TYPICAL PATTERN TO SET UP KOINOBORI up rapidly flowing streams.

Originally, Koinobori was exclusively celebrating boys and recognizing fathers (Boys Day), while Hinamatsuri (March 3) was a day recognized celebrating girls. However, it has since been changed to include both male and female children, as well as recognizing mothers along with fathers and family unity.

In Japan, Children's Day is called *Kodomo no hi* and is a national holiday. It is a day set aside to respect children's personalities and to celebrate their happiness. It was designated a national holiday in 1948 by the Japanese government. It is said that on this day families raise the *Koinobori carp* because there is a Chinese legend that a carp that swims upstream of the Yellow River becomes a dragon and flies to Heaven and the way the Koinobori blows in the wind looks like they are swimming.

Kashiwa mochi (steamed mochi with azuki bean filling) is sometimes served on Children's Day. Since we live in Hawaii, we will use Ti-leaf and serve Kashiwa mochi for refreshments.
