#### **OMAMORI**

Haleiwa Jodo Mission has a variety of omamori.

- 1. Safe driving: Protection of car. This is the most popular omamori in Hawaii. You can hang it in your car.
- 2. Protection for a house: You may place it above the front entrance door of your house. This is to protect your entire house and family members. This omamori will also lead to your business's success and prosperity.
- 3. Protection for a person: This omamori is really compact. You may keep it in your wallet or bag. This omamori will give you good luck and protect you from bad luck.
- 4. Protection for a person (in a bag): A compact omamori in a small purple bag. You may hang it on your shoulder bag or backpack.
- 5. Protection for a person (in a *kinchaku* bag): The same as omamori #4. You may hang it on your bag. These omamori will also drive bad luck away, and welcome good luck which may happen around you.

#### SERMON AT THE GYOKI SERVICE

Rev. Koji Jeff Ezaki Minister of Haleiwa Jodo Mission

Today's Family Service is the Gyoki Service. Gyoki is a memorial service for St. Honen, our Jodoshu founder, who passed away on January 25, 1212, about 800 years ago. The left side of the statue in the front is St. Honen. He was born in Okayama, studied Buddhism in Kyoto, and founded Jodoshu in 1175. His grave is located in Chion-in Temple in Kyoto, Japan. Next year, Jodoshu will celebrate the 850th anniversary of the foundation of our sect. Later, I would like you to watch a short movie clip about our headquarters, Chion-in Temple, on YouTube.

Today, I will explain Shuka Tsukikage or Moonlight in English which we often sing during the Family Services. Please pick up the Otsutome Book again and turn to page 6. Let's read the verses together.

Tsukikageno itaranusatowa nakeredomo
Nagamuruhitono kokoronizosumu.
Though the moon so bright whitens world's expanse,
Only they who earnest gaze,
Touched throughout, within,
Are embraced by serenity.

"Tsukikage" or "Moonlight" is a Jodo-shu anthem composed by St. Honen about 800 years ago. When we read the verse, we do not understand why the moonlight relates to Jodo-shu teachings. Actually, this song contains some metaphors explaining Jodo-shu teachings. The moon in this song represents Amida Buddha. The moon emits moonlight extensively. That is Amida Buddha's boundless compassion. Buddha's love compassion is endless and borderless. Let's take a look at "Only they who earnest gaze." Who are they? That is us, human beings. The moonlight shines over the entire world equally. Likewise, Amida Buddha's compassionate light brightens upon everybody everywhere. The verse says that a person who earnestly gazes at it is embraced by serenity. What does this mean? In order to realize that the moon is beautiful, we must look up at the moon. Without seeing the moon, we do not recognize the beauty of the moon. Amida's love and compassion is Without seeing Buddha, and without the same. reciting "Namu Amida Butsu," we are not aware of Amida's love and compassion. Definitely, Amida Buddha is always watching us, regardless of our awareness. To receive His compassion, we must face up to Buddha.

Again, I will refer to the verse in this song which says "Only they who earnest gaze are embraced by serenity, within." If I reverse this meaning, I would say that those who turn their backs on the moon do not know how beautiful the moon is. They are not even aware of the moon's existence. Amida is the same. Those who turn their backs to Amida Buddha.

cannot receive His love and compassion. Thankfully, Buddha's unconditional love is upon us every time, so we must turn our hearts toward Amida Buddha, saying "Namu Amida Butsu." This song, "Tsukikage" gives us awareness. "Tsuikikage," the moonlight which is the light of Buddha contains everything that we must be aware of. The light teaches us a very important lesson of awareness. During the sutra chanting, we recited "Namu Amida Butsu" with gassho many times. When you recite it, please put your hands together in gassho and say "Namu Amida Butsu," from the bottom of your hearts. I'm sure your faith will become strong and steady in your mind.

Now, we are going to watch a 10-minute movie about Chion-in Temple. It's difficult to find a video in English explaining Japanese temples on YouTube. (Please type "The Amazing Chion-in Complex of Kyoto, Japan" on YouTube and find the short movie we watched during the service)

This is an awesome video, and we were able to understand a lot about Chion-in Temple in a short time. In the video, it said the temple was built as Chion-in in the year 1234, but St. Honen started Jodo-Shu in a small temple in 1175 in that area. At the beginning, Jodo-Shu was small, but they received land and were supported by emperors and shoguns in Japan's history. Chion-in developed gradually over a period of several hundred years.

Recently, Chion in refurbished the roof of the main temple. They started the refurbishment in 2011 and took 9 years for its completion. Chion in replaced 90,000 kawara roof tiles. Initially, the dedication ceremonies were to have taken place in 2020, over a period of one year. Bishop Narashiba, who passed away in 2018, planned a Hawaii Jodo-Shu Japan Trip when he was alive. Because of his sudden death, the plan was put aside. Also, COVID occurred in 2020, so the dedication ceremonies themselves were downsized, and closed ceremonies were observed with a limited number of reverends in Chion-in Temple. Because many things happened during the last few years, we have lost the chance to visit Japan.

Now, taking over Bishop Narashiba's planning, Bishop Ishikawa of Jodo Mission of Hawaii is planning a Japan trip this year in October. The purpose of this trip is "the belated dedication of the main temple" and "the early 850th anniversary of Jodo-Shu." He is still planning to discuss with a travel agency. We do not know the details yet. As soon as the itinerary is released, I will let everybody know. Today, we learned the meaning of Shuka Tsukikage and watched the video of Chion-in Temple. With the reduction of COVID restrictions, more people will be traveling to Japan. I would like you to be interested in the Japanese temples, especially our Jodo-Shu headquarters.

#### History:

Harry Kawamura – a lifelong resident of the Haleiwa/Waialua community – generously provided funding for and established <u>The Marian Masae Kawamura Scholarship</u>, in memory of his beloved wife. Mr. Kawamura has since passed, but the scholarship has continued because of his generosity to the Haleiwa Jodo Mission.

The scholarship was initially offered only to the children of members of the Haleiwa Jodo Mission. It has since been expanded to include members' grandchildren and graduating students of Waialua High School.

#### Eligibility:

Applications for The Marian Masae Scholarship will be accepted from graduating high school students who:

- 1. Is a member or child or grandchild of a member of the Haleiwa Jodo Mission; or
- 2. Is an active Haleiwa Jodo Mission volunteer or a child or grandchild of an active Haleiwa Jodo Mission volunteer; or
- Attends Waialua High School

#### Review:

After the deadline, all applications will be reviewed and the scholarship recipient will be notified and invited to meet the Board Members of the Haleiwa Jodo Mission to formally receive the scholarship award.
