SERMON FOR FAMILY SERVICE ON MAY 5, 2024

Rev. Koji Jeff Ezaki Minister of the Haleiwa Jodo Mission

Good morning, everyone. Today is May 5, 2024, and we are observing May's Family Service. As you noticed when you arrived this morning, there are many koinobori or carp streamers hanging on the temple grounds. May 5 is Boy's Day in Japan to celebrate boys' well-being. There is an expression "Koino takinobori" in Japanese which means a carp climbs up a waterfall, just like salmon in Alaska go up the river against the current. It is said that when a carp climbs up the waterfall, it becomes dragon. One of the Pokemon characters, Koiking, evolves into Garados. Koiking is a carp and Garados is a dragon. Even in the cartoon, it depicts the carp changing its features to the dragon. That is the reason Japanese display koinobori in their yards to wish for children's health and development.

Today, I am going to share with you a story about one of Shakyamuni Buddha's disciples,

Angulimala. Angulimala is a nickname that means "the collector of fingers." It may sound like a strange nickname to be given. His true name is Ahimsaka which means "No harming." The reason he was called Angulimala is he killed people and made a necklace with fingers from his victims. Originally, he was a pure person and followed Brahmanism. Brahmanism was an ancient religion in India before Buddhism. He Brahmanism earnestly studied under Guru. However, his Guru taught him the wrong doctrine and led him in the wrong direction. His Guru told him that if he kills 1,000 people he will enter Heaven. Believing that Ahimsaka, hiding in the forest, attacked people one after the other, who strolled through the forest path. The villagers were scared of him and called him Angulimala. He attacked groups of 20 to 30 people with ease, and even those who had security guards with them. As a bandit, Angulimala roamed the forest, took the life of every person he encountered, and collected fingers to make a necklace.

One day, Shakyamuni Buddha visited a village near the forest where Angulimala was hiding. The

villagers advised him not to go through the forest because there was a violent bandit waiting for his next victim. At that time, Angulimala already had 999 fingers around his neck. The next person would be his 1,000th and final one to achieve his goal. At the same time, Angulimala's mother who was really worried about him, went looking for her son in this village. Knowing that, Shakyamuni decided to enter the forest because Angulimala's mother would likely be the next victim. Angulimala was so desperately searching for the final person to confront, he might have killed his own mother without realizing it. When Shakyamuni entered the forest, Angulimala saw the monk walking. Brandishing a sword, Angulimala ran and attacked Shakyamuni Buddha. Angulimala sprinted after the Buddha and tried to catch up to the Buddha. However, even though he was very fast and the Buddha seemed to be walking, no matter how quickly he ran, he couldn't reach Shakyamuni Buddha. I guoted the scene when Shakyamuni and Angulimala fought each other. Please look at the handout.

Finally. Angulimala shouted. "Stop! moving!" Shakyamuni replied, "I have stopped. It is you who have not stopped." Angulimala didn't understand. He asked, "Why do you say that you have stopped while I have not?" The Buddha replied, "I say that I have stopped because I have given up killing all beings. I have given up ill-treating or harming all living beings. I have cultivated love and patience through meditation. But you—you have not given up killing or ill-treating others, and you have not cultivated love and patience. Therefore, you are the one who has not stopped." These words penetrated the fog of Angulimala's mind and calmed his rage. He thought, "This man is wise and brave. He must be the Awakened One. He must have come here just to help me!" Angulimala threw away his weapons and asked the Buddha to teach him meditation and wisdom. The Buddha agreed.

(Quotation from the Vippasana Research Institution)

In this quotation, Angulimala is talking about physical motion. He was running fast toward Shakyamuni but he never caught up to Shakyamuni and shouted "Stop. Stop!" But Shakyamuni answered with his inner motion in his mind, saying, "I have stopped and you have not." This story expresses our mind. We are not a killer or a bandit but we, humans, sometimes kill animals for our benefit or to destroy nature. You came here for the service but you might have run over small insects on the road. Or, you always feel I want this, I want that, with endless desires. You might tell lies to protect yourself or be angry, complain, or speak ill of others to please your own ego. Our mind is restless, going here and there covered with delusions. Angulimala realized that his mind was conquered by the wrong doctrine. His mind was always jumping to the next thing

through delusion. Guided by Shakyamuni Buddha, Angulimala understood that meeting a true Teacher like Shakyamuni Buddha was the right path to correct himself. From that moment, Angulimala cut his hair and became Shakyamuni's disciple. But because he killed 999 people in the forest, the villagers who lost their loved ones couldn't just forgive him and do nothing. I will share another passage on the handout which describes what happened to Angulimala after that.

Angulimala, once a terrible bandit who had killed many people, was saved by the Blessed One, and he became one of His disciples. One day he went begging for food in a town and endured much hardship and suffering for his past evil deeds. The villagers fell upon him and beat him severely, but he went back to the Blessed One with his body still bleeding, falling at His feet and thanking Him for the opportunity that had come to him to suffer for his former cruel deeds. He said, "Blessed One, my name originally was 'No Harming,' but because of my ignorance, I took many precious lives, and from each I took a finger, because of that, I came to be called Angulimala, the collector of fingers! Today, Blessed One, I have suffered only what was my due, I do not wish to live, I do not wish to die. I only wait for my time to come.

(Quotation from The Teaching of Buddha)

Angulimala was attacked cruelly by the villagers who threw rocks and mud at him, and was beaten with wooden sticks and weapons. At that moment, Shakyamuni advised Angulimala to acknowledge his actions, self-reflect sincerely, and make amends to purify himself. He was calm and accepted their anger. He was a very rare case of a person who killed many people that could become a disciple of Shakyamuni Buddha. We usually feel the person who kills harms others cannot become or enlightened. Rather we wish those people would go to Hell. He did a lot of bad deeds and harmed others but after he met Shakyamuni he reflected upon what he accepted social sanctions did and from villagers. He corrected himself. There is another quotation of Shakyamuni's words on the handout. Please look at it.

> Irrigators lead the waters; fletchers bend the arrows; carpenters bend the wood; the wise control themselves. (Dhammapada 80)

This passage says that you must correct and control yourself not to be conquered by delusions. Who is the wise? That is you. Everybody has the potential to become Angulimala because we all have delusions in our minds. Without stopping, our minds are always moving and jumping around. Stop desire, stop anger, stop hatred, and blow out your delusions like Angulimala.
