AMIDA BUDDHA RESTORATION

Thanks to a generous grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, we have begun the restoration of our Amida Buddha from our main temple altar.

Phase I was performed by Naomi Sasaoka of Tohoku University of Art and Design, Institute of Conservation of Cultural property and Makoto Monden. Professor Tomoe Moriya of Nanzan Institute for Religion and Culture, and Kazuko Hioki of UH Manoa Library Preservation Dept. also came and assisted with research and documentation.

Phase II is scheduled for completion in May. Our sincere mahalo to the conservators, Maya Hara for securing and managing the grant, Wailuku Jodo Mission for graciously housing our Buddha and use of social hall for the conservation work, and Machiko Nagao and Yayoi Hara for assisting with meals.



PAGODA URNS CLEANED & CATALOGED

On January 18 & 19, 2025, with the support of many dedicated individuals and the generous support of the National Heritage Responders grant we successfully cleaned and cataloged the urns from the Pagoda.

Although, the urns sustained fire damage, making some engravings difficult to read, we are grateful to report that 85% of the urns were identified and cataloged. The urns are now securely stored in the blue container on the temple property.

TEMPLE BELL DAMAGE ASSESSMENT

Our temple bell—*Imin hyakunen no kane* (Centennial Commemoration Bell), was dedicated in 1968 to honor the 100th anniversary of the first Japanese immigrants' arrival in Hawaii.

The bell was rung daily at 8 PM to pay tribute to our predecessor and offer prayers for world peace. We also celebrated New Year's by ringing the temple bell 108 times in our traditional *Joya no Kane* (New Year's Bell Ringing Ceremony).

On December 19, 2024 we were able to inspect and test the sound of the bell. While the surface of the bell sustained significant damage, we are grateful to report that its sound remains intact—a testament to its enduring spirit and resilience.
