

The Higher Awareness Bishop Kosen Ishikawa



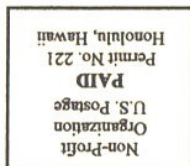
Dear Members and Friends of Jodo Mission,

When I was a young child, I had a dream that I would one day become Prime Minister of Japan. It may sound silly now, but at the time I was quite serious. I really did wish to be the leader of Japan. Looking back, it seems especially humorous considering that I became a minister, instead of a prime minister. In a small way, a part of my dream did come true, since a Buddhist minister and a prime minister are both called *minister*. The difference being that I'm serving Buddha, Dharma and Sangha, whereas a prime minister serves the Nation, the Diet and the People.

During my moving to Honolulu, I stumbled across some old photo albums. Looking through the photographs of myself as a boy, I recalled my dream. I was surprised at how many facts and events of my youth I had completely forgotten. Maybe this is because I've always tried to look forward, moving ahead, not focusing too much on the past. It was interesting to me, while I turned the pages, how I was always the leader of the organization that I belonged to.

As a youth, I thought leadership roles at the different organizations had just *happened*. Looking back as an adult, I can see there was a strong reason. I've always had high ideals. I'm an idealist. I've always had higher goals in mind, and I think because of this, my friends voted me in as their leader.

Over decades ago I had the good fortune to see a documentary film called "*Japanese-Americans in Hawaii*." It was my first glimpse into the history and hardships of the Japanese immigrants. Rev. Gensho Hara of Lahaina Jodo Mission was interviewed. It made a lasting impact on my life. Other prominent Japanese Americans were also interviewed. One interesting story was the life of Mr. Sidney Kosasa, who was the founder of the ABC stores on O'ahu. His parents were Japanese immigrants, and as a boy, Mr. Kosasa worked in his parents' grocery store. They eventually opened one store after another. What surprised me was the number of ABC branch stores in one small area of Waikiki. In some cases, ABC stores were located next door to one other. What intrigued me while watching Mr. Kosasa's interview, was that he had a completely different viewpoint than most businessmen. It was commonly believed that if you opened a new store too close to another existing store, you would simply be robbing customers from one store, while they frequented your other store.

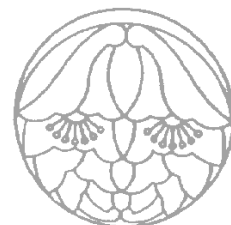

Father's Day Service & Special Showing of the NHK Documentary "Rekishi Tantei" **Sunday, June 19, 2022 at 10:00 am**

Showing of the **NHK Documentary "Rekishi Tantei (Historical Detective)"** will be held during the **Father's Day Sunday Service starting at 10:00am**. The theme of this documentary is "Pearl Harbor" from a brand-new approach of colorization of old photos. This program introduces **Bishop Ninryo Nago** who was the 8th Head minister of the Hawaii Jodo Shu and influenced the life of a Japanese soldier, **Mr. Kazuo Sakamaki** who was known as the first POW of the Pacific War after the Pearl Harbor attack. At that time, being a POW was regarded to be "shame" and Bishop Nago encouraged Mr. Sakamaki to live proudly and strongly.

This was originally on aired on December 7, 2021 and Jodo Mission helped Ms. Ritsue Honma who was a media coordinator of the program to research about Bishop Nago. **Bishop Ishikawa and Rev. **Hatsu Bon families who cannot make the Friday 10 am service, may also attend any other service and your Hatsu Bon O-Toba will be read.*

Visitations to O-Tobas— With the help of volunteers, we will open the Social Hall for families to visit their O-Tobas with their offerings of flowers and foods. Hours the Social Hall doors will be open for your visits will depend on the number of volunteers we have. See July Bulletin for update.

Volunteers Needed in Social Hall July 18-24— If you have some time to spare, would you please contact temple office. It does not have to be every day during this period, but a few hours would be most appreciated. The more volunteers we have the more time we can allow relatives to visit their O-Tobas. If we do not have volunteers, we will close the social hall doors.

What kinds of things can you do as a volunteer in the social hall— you may help someone find his/her O-Toba; make sure we don't have too many people in the social hall; if there is a private service happening, please ask visitor(s) to not interfere with service; depending on Covid, we may ask people to wear masks inside the social hall, if elderly needs help, you may have to help him/her with their offerings as we do not want them to fall or hurt themselves.

Private Services—Reservations for private O-Toba services can be made by calling (808) 949-3995. Private O-Toba services Monday, July 18 to Thursday, July 21 between 10 am to 1 pm and 3 pm to 6 pm. These private services can be held in the social hall in front of your O-Toba or O-Toba(s) can be brought to the temple to have your private service in the temple. This is especially recommended for more than 5 people. There is no limitation on how many people can attend a private service in the temple but we do request, if possible, to let us know the number of people attending.

Jodo Mission of Hawaii **Bon Dance** is scheduled for **August 19 - 20, 2022**. Plans are being made subject to any new guidelines.

Father's Day -June 19th at 10 am: We always remember our Mothers, but do we always remember our Fathers? Please come to our in-person Father's Day Service on Sunday, June 19th at 10 a.m. We will take temperature checks, everyone wears a mask and keep social distance. Even though you may have taken the Covid vaccine, we must still be careful and use the sanitizer and wash hands often with soap.



Please try to remember your father on Father's Day, June 19th. Give him a telephone call and have a nice chat with him or if you live with him, say *Happy Father's Day* and give him a hand made Father's Day card. He will appreciate it.

Columbarium or Nokotsudo—Are you familiar with these terms?

"Columbarium" in a Buddhist temple is a room with little cubicles called "niches" where deceased ashes are placed in ash cases or urns. It's called "Nokotsudo" in Japanese, which literally means "Temple hall to keep bones (ashes)".



Niche Owners at Jodo Mission of Hawaii should continue to pay their membership dues each year since as a member you were able to purchase a niche from Jodo Mission of Hawaii. Some people may have inherited the niches because the niche or niches have their relatives in them. When the niche or niches were originally purchased that individual was a member of this temple. When he/she passes, whoever in the family carries on the responsibility of the niche should continue to pay membership dues and niche maintenance. **What is niche maintenance you might ask?** Niche maintenance fee is currently and has been for many, many years \$5 per year. This maintenance fee is so that the columbarium or nokotsudo is respectably clean and maintained in a dignified manner. If your niche is empty and you have no use for the niche, please come to the office to sign a document that you relinquish the niche back to Jodo Mission of Hawaii. **Niches cannot be sold to another individual.**

Some people in lieu of paying for membership and niche maintenance prefer to give a donation every year equivalent to membership fee and maintenance, That is totally acceptable and appreciated in honor of your beloved ancestors. What is “Perpetual Memorial Service?” (Eitaikyo)

This record of a perpetual memorial service is called *Eitaikyo* in Japanese. When the date of death occurs for a person listed on this record, the ministers pray for that individual during the morning service. The prayers will continue each year for as long as Jodo Mission exists.

Anyone can be included in it. You may put your own name on the list, too. This also helps when it is difficult to have memorial services. We also welcome you to attend the morning service at **9:30am**. (Note time change due to Covid-19, please call temple if you plan to attend.)

How to apply

Stop by the office, and fill out the application form. Each name costs \$200. After the application is accepted, the name will be listed on the record.

Notice to Nokotsudo Visitors

(Sometimes referred to as the **Niche** rooms)

Many people call to see if the Nokotsudo/ Columbarium (or sometimes known as Niche rooms) are open. We have been letting people in if you come and ring the blue bell. **You must wear a mask, use the hand sanitizer going in and coming out and go home and wash your hands with soap.** No more than 4 people at a time, with social distancing.
