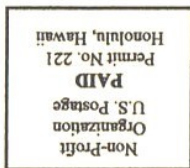

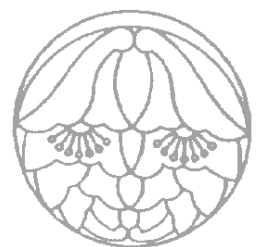

Message by Bishop Kosen Ishikawa

Dear Members and Friends of Jodo Mission,

As we welcome 2022 O-Bon, I'd like to express my sincerest Aloha to you, your family and to your beloved ones. Also, I wish to take this opportunity to thank you for your warm support, financially, materially, and spiritually.



Recently, I find myself busier everyday not only because O-Bon is just around the corner but because I have started janitorial work as our long time janitor Priscilla retired on April 1st. Because one of my priorities was to save temple's operation cost, instead of looking for a new janitor, I offered our board that we ministers take over being janitors. I'm so glad both Rev. Takano and Rev. Tanabe immediately agreed with me. Also, I'm so grateful to the board members who supported the raise for our salaries by doing this additional job.

In Buddhism, especially at the Japanese Buddhist temples, three things have been treasured and encouraged to do every day. They are 1. Cleaning, 2. Daily Service, 3. Studying. These are actually mentioned in the following saying; "Ichi Soji, Ni Gongyo, San Gakumon" meaning "The very first thing to do is cleaning. Secondly, daily service and thirdly, studying Buddhism." In a sense, these are Buddhist ministers' important daily routine and cleaning comes first of all.

Needless to say, cleaning is like endless job. No matter how well you sweep the ground, on the next moment, you might see fallen leaves from the trees. Especially, it is now flowering season of "Shower trees." As I sweep the temple ground every morning, I need to spend more and more time to do this same routine as more and more petals of the shower trees keep coming down. I deeply realize this is such a really good practice of perseverance. At the same time, I regard this can be good practice of meditation as this cleaning keeps me being busy to live in this very moment. By concentrating on picking up leaves, I can easily forget about myself; my regret in the past and worries in the future. In addition, I can always have great feeling of purity after working hard. Yes, cleaning is such a rewarding practice.

In fact, Cūḍa-panthaka, one of Buddha's disciples was said to be able to realize enlightenment just by sweeping the ground. Once Cūḍa-panthaka was known as stupid at that time before meeting his master Buddha. He couldn't remember even his name. Then Buddha gave a simple advice to him. That was to sweep the temple ground singleheartedly every day. He also advised Cūḍa-panthaka to say "Sweep the dust and remove the dirt" whenever he cleans the temple.

After many years of doing this simple task every day, one day Cūḍa-panthaka realized dust and dirt were nothing but his own desires which kept arising. Thus, he was able to face and control his own desires and became enlightened. Cūḍa-panthaka is now known as one of the 16 great Arhats.

I think this story can be a great example that anything we do can be a great practice. Our current life under the covid pandemic, has been so stressful and frustrating every day. Unfortunately, we cannot change this stressful life but please remember we can always change ourselves to accept this reality with positive thoughts. Let us take a deep breath and recite "Namu Amida Butsu" whenever you wake up. You will soon realize peace and gratitude that you are living right now.

Once again, Mahalo for being our valuable member and supporter. We staff of Jodo Mission are always praying for your good health and happiness every day through our daily service. If you need spiritual assistance, please feel free to let us know. Especially if

you haven't met me yet, please stop by to say hello to me. "Talk stories" is more than welcome!

5. Monthly Bulletin (currently we send bulletin to our supporters as complimentary).
6. Invitation to our special events such as New Year's Party.

More Information About O-Bon

O-Bon is the time of the year when our ancestors' spirits come back from the Pure Land and stay in this world. While here we offer flowers, their favorite foods, fruits, candies, etc. to welcome them back for a short time. This O-Bon, Jodo Mission of Hawaii would like everyone to be safe. **Facial masks will be required while in the temple and in the social hall.**

Registration for O-Bon Service will begin **1 hour before** 10 am & 6 pm services. Registration is by Sponsor's Name. At time of registration, your Otoba card or cards will be taken out to let the minister know you are here for that particular service. This is on a first come first serve basis. NO phone orders will be taken.

Once you register, you may go either to visit your Otoba or go inside the temple and wait for the service to begin.

O-Bon Service—During the O-Bon Service, please be aware when they begin calling the Sponsor Names. When your Sponsor's name is called, please bow to Amida Buddha who is in the altar and go to the rear of the temple hall and offer incense at the Segaki-dan. After offering of incense, you may go to your Otoba for a final goodbye or you may return to your seat and when all the Sponsor names have been called, you may follow the ministers as they go downstairs to the social hall and go through each row of Otobas for the final blessing for this service. The Minister may give you an opportunity to offer incense while before the Otobas.



Offerings at your Otoba: You will have about 5 inches by 12 inches of space to place your offerings. Photo at right shows the length from the Otoba base to the edge of the table. Because the Otobas are indoors, we recommend that you please be careful with any potted plants and make sure there is a tray underneath the plant. Those with many families will have to coordinate with the space available.



No Potted Mums Will Be Sold: Due to Coronavirus and lack of manpower, Sr. YBA decided not to sell potted mums.

Offering of Rice: During O-Bon, it is customary to offer a bag of rice. However, monetary donations in lieu of rice are acceptable. "Rice" envelopes are available in the office. Thank you for your understanding and support.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED: If anyone has any time they can spare (especially from July 18 to 24), please contact the temple office at (808) 949-3995 with your contact information and someone will call you back.

Volunteers also needed on O-Toba Set Up and temple cleaning day (July 17 at 9am) **and O-Toba Kuzushi** or take down day (July 24 after the final O-Bon service at 10 am with Kuzushi about 11:30 am). **Please call temple office if you are able to help on any of these days. Thank you.**

Notice to Nokotsudo Visitors (Sometimes referred to as the **Niche** rooms)

Many people call to see if the Nokotsudo/ Columbarium (or sometimes known as Niche rooms) are open. We have been letting people in if you come and ring the blue bell. **You must wear a mask, use the hand sanitizer going in and coming out and go home and wash your hands with soap.** No more than 4 people at a time, with social distancing.
