## Regulation 04-2024 Establishing the

# Heraldic Coronets of the Georgian Nobility

Approved by HRH Crown Prince Davit of Georgia on 02 May 2024. Last modified on 25 April 2025.

This regulation outlines the standards for the appearance of coronets in the heraldry of each rank of the Georgian nobility. It is intended to provide a formal standard from the Royal House of Georgia for the composition of these elements to provide clear guidance to nobles and heraldic artists on this subject.

The Royal Heraldic College of Georgia has built these regulations on the foundation of historical precedents of the established uses of each element, recognizing the diverse influences impressed upon the heraldic practices of the Georgian nobility. In certain cases where several coronets have been used for the same rank, the College recommends regularizing the disparate practices via following the Italian approach<sup>1</sup> (which, like Georgia, has at times been divided into different polities, incorporated into foreign entities, and whose heraldic practices draw upon a variety of disparate influences & with nobles originating from a variety of quarters) of allowing for these multiple forms to be used interchangeably for that rank, with these as the defined options going forward for future use.

# Types of Coronets of Rank

# Prince/Tavadi/Mtavari **Rank Coronet** Description Blazoned as the "Princely Hat of a Georgian High Noble Prince/Princess" or as a "Georgian High Noble Prince's/Princess's/Princely Hat" **Composition:** a chapeau Gules turned up Ermine set globus cruciger Azure banded and topped with a cross pattée Or, atop 4 arches (3 visible) Or edged with pearls Argent. Usage: For use by Mtavaris, Tavadis, and Princes who hold the style of *His or Her Highness*, as well as by ancient Tavadis whose titles predate 1867.2 **Rank Coronet** Description Blazoned as the "Princely Hat of a Georgian noble Prince/Princess" or as a "Georgian noble Prince's/Princess's/Princely hat" **Composition:** a chapeau Gules turned up Ermine set globus cruciger atop 4 arches (3 visible) Or edged with pearls Argent.<sup>3</sup>

² In 1867, the Principality of Mingrelia (სამეგრელოს სამთავრო, also called Samegrelo), which had been a Russian protectorate since 1803, was dissolved by the Russian Empire, marking the last time a Georgian monarch of any rank held a throne.



Rank Coronet	Description	
	Blazoned as the "Coronet of a Georgian Duke/Duchess" or as a "Georgian Duke's/Duchess's/Ducal coronet"  Composition: a coronet set with 8 acanthus leaves (5 visible) Or. <sup>4</sup> The use of gemstones or chasing on the circlet is optional.	

Marquis/Marquise		
Rank Coronet	Description	
	Blazoned as the "Coronet of a Georgian Marquis/Marquise" or as a "Georgian Marquis's/Marquise's/Marquisal coronet"  Composition: a coronet set with 4 acanthus leaves (3 visible) Or alternating with 4 groups of three pearls in trefoil (2 visible) Argent. 5 The use of gemstones or chasing on the circlet is optional.

Blazoned as the "Coronet of a Georgian Count/Countess" or as a "Georgian Count's/Countess's/Comital coronet"

**Composition:** A coronet with a rim Or set with 16 pearls (9 visible) Argent raised on tines of the first.<sup>6</sup> The use of gemstones or chasing on the circlet is optional.

Blazoned as the "Coronet of a Georgian Count/Countess" or as a "Georgian Count's/Countess's/Comital coronet"

**Composition:** A coronet with a rim Or set with 16 pearls (9 visible) Argent. The use of gemstones or chasing on the circlet is optional.



Rank Coronet	Description	
	Blazoned as the "Coronet of a Georgian Viscount/Viscountess" or as a "Georgian Viscount's/Viscountess's/Vicomital coronet"  Composition: A coronet with a rim Or set with four pearls (three visible) Argent raised on high points/tines of the first alternating with four smaller pearls (two visible) of the second raised on lower points of the first. * The use of gemstones or chasing on the circlet is optional.

Baron	
Rank Coronet	Description
	Blazoned as the "Coronet of a Georgian Baron/Baroness" or as a "Georgian Baron's/Baroness's/Baronial coronet"  Composition: A coronet with a rim Or entwined with a string of small pearls and set with six large pearls (four visible) Argent. The use of gemstones or chasing on the circlet is optional.  Note: The most common form of the baronial coronet used for post-1917 baronial grants, following styles seen first in Spain and other parts of Western Europe.9
Alternate Rank Coronet 1	Description
	Blazoned as the "Coronet of a Georgian Baron/Baroness" or as a "Georgian Baron's/Baroness's/Baronial coronet"  Composition: A coronet with a rim Or entwined with a string of small pearls Argent. The use of gemstones or chasing on the circlet is optional.  Note: Optionally emblazoned in lieu of the above in keeping with one of the styles of baronial coronets introduced from Western Europe used by some Georgian barons <sup>10</sup> .
Alternate Rank Coronet 2	Description

Blazoned as the "Coronet of a Georgian Baron/Baroness" or as a "Georgian Baron's/Baroness's/Baronial coronet"

**Composition:** A coronet with a rim Or set with 12 pearls (7 visible) Argent raised on tines of the first. *The use of gemstones or chasing on the circlet is optional.* 


**Note:** Optionally emblazoned in lieu of the above for Georgian barons in keeping with one of the styles of coronet used by many Barons in the **Russian** nobility as well as in parts of **Western & Central Europe**, in accommodation of nobles following heraldic practices influenced by Russian practice.<sup>11</sup>

# Rank Coronet Description Blazoned as the "Coronet of a Georgian Noble/an Aznauri" or as a "Georgian Noble's coronet" Composition: A coronet with a rim set with 4 leaves (3 visible) Or alternating with 4 pearls (2 visible) Argent. The use of gemstones or chasing on the circlet is optional. Note: Used by some Aznauri under the Russian Empire and Kartli-Kakheti<sup>12</sup> in line with the heraldic practices of untitled nobles from Russia and from some other jurisdictions in Western Europe.

# Item 11: Italian Coronet Varieties Chart




Chart of different Italian coronet types. Some, though not all, will have 2 or three versions which are considered interchangeable and acceptable for use by that rank, recognizing a variety of historic variations and influences on the region and its heraldry.

This regulation recognizes something similar for those ranks (namely comital and baronial) of the Georgian nobility wherein the diverse influences on the system have generated instances of a few different forms of coronet being used by nobles of said ranks.
