

THE CRISIS



A cyberattack targeted Romania's Vidraru Dam, which disrupted its automated systems and caused uncontrolled water discharge. This led to catastrophic flooding along the Argeş River, severely impacting Curtea de Argeş with inundated infrastructure and overwhelmed emergency services. Downstream areas face continued threats, including Piteşti, a NATO-relevant city hosting key military facilities. Suspicions link the attack to escalating Romania-Russia tensions following a Romanian law authorizing military interventions abroad.

Simultaneously, heightened activity in the High North reveals Russian naval, aerial, and ground movements near NATO territories, including unannounced fleet exercises and airspace incursions. Further complicating matters, a Russian operative in Norway exploited software vulnerabilities at Svalsat to facilitate a supply chain attack by APT28 (Fancy Bear), a GRU-linked cyberespionage group. These coordinated threats underscore geopolitical instability and critical infrastructure vulnerabilities, demanding urgent international attention.



THE CONFERENCE

The proceedings of Day One commenced with embassy visits for our esteemed delegates, during which they were provided with a comprehensive briefing on their designated country's role within NATO. Subsequently, the event continued at the Federal Academy for Security Policy (BAKS), where the opening ceremony took place, featuring speeches delivered by Ambassador Markus Woelke, Vice-President at BAKS, Siemtje Möller, patron for Model NATO Germany 2024, and a keynote address delivered by Dr. Gerlinde Niehus, Former NATO Director Defense Deputy of and Security Cooperation.

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After the opening ceremony, each committee started by establishing their agenda, the delegates deliberated on various agenda items, including strategies to address the Svalbard situation and its broader implications for NATO policies in the High North. At the same time, the Military Committee received an Action Plan from the Supreme Allied Commander, outlining the different military options that were currently envisioned for the crisis at hand.

In the evening, delegates gathered at the facilities of the Konrad Adenauer Stiftung for a panel discussion on the topic "Striking a Balance – Europe's Quest for Autonomy Amidst US Dependency." Colonel John Andreas Olson and Dr. Karl-Heinz Kamp, experts in their respective fields, provided valuable insights into the complexities of transatlantic relations and Europe's evolving security landscape. Moderated by Dr. Christina Krause, this panel discussion allowed for in-depth discussions between our delegates and the experts, allowing both parties to learn from each other and expand their horizons regarding Europe's role within NATO and beyond.



DAY 2 THE CONFERENCE

Before Delegates began their committee sessions on Day 2, they received a new briefing with developments on the crisis situation:

Amid ongoing geopolitical tensions, significant developments unfolded in the High North. A Russian naval task force was detected near Svalbard, moving westward at a slow pace. Several vessels left the group though satellite coverage overnight, limitations hindered complete tracking. In parallel, unidentified drones were observed over Longyearbyen, raising questions about their purpose. The ground activity also came under scrutiny as a social media post revealed the presence of a Chechen Akhmat special unit member near Barentsburg, though details of their arrival remain unclear.

Compounding the situation, Killnet, a prohacktivist Russian group. claimed responsibility for a cyberattack Romania's Vidraru Dam, heightening fears about infrastructure vulnerabilities. This act was accompanied by a statement from the Russian Foreign Ministry, deflecting blame and urging dialogue. Meanwhile, China released findings on the crash of a Norwegian Coast Guard aircraft near Svalbard, citing potential foreign interference without identifying a cause. These incidents underscore the growing instability in the Arctic, a region of strategic and scientific significance.

Apart from the simulation, delegates got the chance to participate in a Security Dialogue at BAKS, which allowed them to discuss relevant geopolitical with experts and professionals in the security policy field.



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On the third day of the conference, the Operations Policy Committee and the Military Committee had to complete their military and political advice so that the North Atlantic Council could approve it on Friday. At the same time, delegates had to respond to a new briefing, which escalated the situation in Svalbard.

Tensions in the High North escalated as the Russian naval task force halted near the southern tip of Svalbard, performing practice shots at sea.

Admiral Nakhimov, the fleet's flagship, entered Barentsburg's port to public celebrations, signaling strong local ties. Meanwhile, a subgroup of vessels navigated west around Bear Island, showcasing strategic maritime positioning.

In parallel, a disinformation campaign targeting Norway, Finland, and Sweden surfaced.

OSINT analysts from Bellingcat identified Alenhanced videos spreading false narratives, including claims of U.S. exploitation of Europe, nuclear attack footage, and fabricated local warnings urging food hoarding. These efforts heightened regional unease.

Unexpectedly, Russian authorities arrested key members of the pro-Russian hacktivist group Killnet following the Vidraru Dam cyberattack. While the arrests were publicized, state media coverage was restrained, and there was no indication of broader action against the group, leaving their network largely intact.

The highlight of the day came as both the OPC and MC were able to vote in favor of a complete recommendations package for the NAC.

DAY 3



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DAY 4 THE CONFERENCE



On the last day of the conference, the delegates from the North Atlantic Council, with the support of their delegation, had to vote in favor of the recommendations of the OPC and MC and finalize their communiqué. Before this, however, delegates received a final briefing detailing crucial information:

Russian naval activity persisted in the High North as the task force altered its course to head southeast, with Admiral Nakhimov rejoining after its high-profile visit to Barentsburg. Concurrently, vessels that had circumnavigated Bear Island also moved southeast, aligning their trajectory with the main fleet.

Amid these developments, a Norwegian submarine uncovered five hydroacoustic sensors on the seabed near Svalbard, in areas previously traversed by the Russian fleet. These sensors, designed for reconnaissance and tracking submarine movements, raise concerns about broader surveillance efforts. Speculation suggests that other ships, including civilian vessels like fishing boats, may have participated in deploying the sensors. Investigations continue to determine the full scope of these activities, further complicating the Arctic security environment.




Despite these developments, delegates swiftly adapted their final communiqué to address the final briefing. As such, and after four days of intense negotiations and debates, the North Atlantic Council voted unanimously on a final communiqué.




